
on May 10th both online and in person, with the option again to borrow a garage sale sign with a stake with a refundable damage deposit. More information

Bingo cards can be submitted anytime between March 29th and April 6th. They can be submitted via email or place in our mailbox outside the Dalhousie Community Centre. Once all submissions are collected, the DCA will cross reference to ensure that all entries are members and to confirm lines on card. You can submit one Bingo card per person that is indicated on your membership form you submitted to received your membership, however if there are multiple submissions per membership, you must use different versions of the Bingo cards that are available. For example, a family of 4 with 4 participating members can complete Bingo cards A, B, C, and D. They could not complete (4) Bingo cards labelled A and so forth. WHY IS THERE A "MORLEY TRAIL" IN DALHOUSIE?

Dalhousie history as part of Alberta history is fascinating. There is overwhelming evidence that less than 20,000 years ago, our community was covered in hundreds of feet of ice. You can still find fossils of shells and other sea life along the Bow River valley. The first evidence of people is less than 10,000 years ago. Buffalo Jumps have been excavated not only at Head Smashed in Buffalo Jump but as close as Big Hills Springs Provincial Park, just west of the city.



The Tsuut'ina (formerly known as Sarcee) Nation lived near the confluence of the Bow and the Elbow Rivers, the Nehinaw (formerly known as Cree) Nation lived farther to the north and east of Calgary, the Niitsitapi (formerly known as Blackfoot) Nation lived to the south, and the Nakota (formerly known as the Stoney) Nation lived in the Foothills. Occasionally they would war with each other and occasionally there would be peace and they would trade with each other.



There were trails established between the Indigenous communities and these trails became the basis for our modern roads. You might ask why the trail between the Tsuut'ina and Nakota veered so far north of the Bow River all the way to current Dalhousie. It is because it was impossible to walk beside the river the whole way due to places where there are sheer cliffs right down to the water (ie. In Silver Springs). If you chose to walk along the top of the buff, there were too many places where water had eroded the ground into valleys resulting in many hills and difficult terrain to walk. Only when you went farther away from the river, do you come to gradually rising and falling terrain which was easy to travel.

There are remnants of Morley Trail in Brentwood, Dalhousie and farther west. Morley is an English word that is derived from "mor" or marsh, and "leah" or clearing in the woods. In 1930, it was paved and renamed #1 (Trans-Canada) Highway. In 1954, the new Trans-Canada Highway was built on the south side of the Bow River in its current location, and the road was renamed again to the "1A Highway". It remained a two-lane highway without shoulders until in 1969, when it was renamed again to Crowchild Trail in honour of David Crowchild, chief of the Tsuut'ina Nation. Crowchild Trail. Now it is a four to six lane highway, but the original path that is Morley Trail remains as part of Dalhousie.

SPRING IS HERE - PROTECT YOUR BIKES!

COVID has resulted in a boom in bike use across the city. As we head into spring, remember to keep your bikes locked up or securely stored. You can also help protect your bike by registering it online through bikeindex.org Bike Index is an online registry tool used by Calgary Police Service to help return stolen bikes to their owners since 2019. In May 2020, officers returned over \$12,000 worth of bikes to Calgarians with the help of this online program. Bike Index is a free, voluntary database used by bike owners, bike shops and police services. If a registered bike is stolen, an owner can login and make note that their bike is missing. In the event it is recovered by police, or looked up by an unsuspecting buyer, its status on Bike Index will appear as stolen and alert those searching that serial number. If you are buying a bike you can also look up the serial number to verify it has not been reported as stolen. If you are selling a bike that you have previously registered, you can transfer registration to the new buyer.

To use Bike Index to register a bike, you will be asked to provide information like the make, model, colour, serial number and other defining characteristics of your bike. If you are reporting a bike as stolen, you can provide photos and need to provide a phone number or email for police to contact you should your stolen bike be recovered. The most important piece of information for the data base is a serial number. All bikes should have one. Most have their serial number engraved beneath their bottom bracket (where the crank arms connect to the frame) or above the front fork. If you find more than one number on your bike, enter all of them.

The website is easy to use and offers support if you are having difficulties. Take a few minutes and protect your bikes by registering them today!





Emergency Medical Safety



Head injuries are the leading cause of serious injury and death to kids on wheels*. Most injuries occur when a cyclist suffers a fall, strikes a stationary object, or collides with another cyclist/pedestrian. Remember - it's the law in Alberta that cyclists under the age of 18 must wear a helmet (and highly recommended for all ages). Helmets should be CSA approved and worn during recreational activities such as skateboarding, in-line skating, and cycling.

Getting informed

- Wearing a helmet while cycling can prevent a serious injury, or even save a life;
- Brain injuries can cause permanent disability or death;
- Reduce your risk by always wearing your helmet;
- Replace any helmet that has been involved in a crash, even if it appears undamaged.

Getting started


- Allow children to assist when buying their helmet. Cyclists who choose their own helmet are more likely to wear them;
- Start the habit early. Young children learning to ride tricycles need to wear helmets;
- Parents must lead by example always wear a helmet when cycling.

Getting the right fit

- Take the time to properly fit and adjust your helmet to ensure maximum protection in case of a crash:
- When worn properly, helmets should fit level, not tilted up, or down over the forehead;
- Helmets should feel snug, but not too tight. To test the fit, the helmet should not fall off when you shake your head from side-to-side while the straps are unfastened:
- Adjust the chin straps to form a "Y" below and slightly forward from the ears:
- Only one finger should be able to fit under the chin strap when it is fastened;
- Do not forget to use the sizing pads included with the helmet. They will help improve the overall fit, comfort and safety.

There is also a full-size gym in West Dalhousie Elementary, and smaller gyms in H. D. Cartwright J.H.S, Dalhousie Elementary, St. Dominic's Elementary and Dalhousie Community Church that are available for rent. We are truly fortunate to have so many facilities at our disposal.



Programs have been more of a challenge for the past year due to the Corona Virus. Provincial and municipal restrictions have forced may programs to close or open at a fraction of the previous capacity. The board of directors are constantly putting out feelers to see if there is interest or need for a program that is currently not being offered. Most recently, we asked the residents if there was interest in a Blockwatch Program or a farmer's market. There was no interest in one and very little interest in the other which is okay. We also use to run a "Triple A" program for seniors, but that shut down a couple of years ago due to declining interest. 

As part of The City's life-cycle maintenance and major roads restoration program, we're completing pavement reconstruction and restoration work on John Laurie Blvd. N.W. Improvements will include road restoration and rehabilitation of John Laurie Blvd. from Shaganappi Tr. to 14 St., as well as full intersection reconstruction at Brisebois Dr. This project will improve roadway operation, safety and surface characteristics of the roadway between Shaganappi Tr. and 14 St. and help to ensure the road continues to be safe, functional and in great condition for years to come. HOW RESIDENTIAL SPEED LIMIT CHANGES WILL AFFECT DALHOUSIE

On February 1, 2021, the City of Calgary voted to implement a new speed limit law which will go into effect on May 31, 2021. It means any road that does not have a posted speed limit is assumed to have a 40 km/hour speed limit. This will affect almost all roads in the community of Dalhousie. Further details can be found at www.calgary.ca/transportation/roads/traffic/traffic-safety-programs/residential-speed-limits.html Included is a Ward 4 map which shows which streets in Dalhousie are deemed to be "collector roads" and will remain at a 50 km/hr speed limit. It looks like only Dalhousie Drive, 53rd Street, and portions of 66th Avenue, Dalton Drive and Dalcastle Drive will have signs posted allowing vehicles to drive 50 kms/hour. Have a look at the map, and see how you might be impacted.

Our Councillor, Sean Chu, was one of 4 Councillors who voted against the change. He also requested that this issue be put to the voters as a plebiscite, but this was voted down by Council. The City of Calgary keeps records of the locations of all traffic incidents which can be found at "data.calgary.ca/transportationtransit/traffic incidents/35ra-9556". This includes incidents of all kinds including single vehicle, multiple vehicles, pedestrian, cyclist or other.

It will be interesting to see how this change impacts our neighborhoods. Maybe, as we adjust our driving habits, our streets will become more of a shared space. What do you think?

DALHOUSIE CRIME RATES LOW-BLOCKWATCH PROGRAM ON HOLD

Each community is assigned a liaison officer from the Calgary Police Service (CPS) and ours made a presentation at the February 2021 Dalhousie Community Association (DCA) meeting. He reported that in Dalhousie in the month of January, there were 0 residential break-ins, 1 commercial break-in, 0 auto thefts, 4 car prowling's, 0 robberies, 0 home invasions, 2 assaults and 21 calls to the LRT station. He reminded residents to report all crimes even if nobody was injured or if no property was stolen. The CPS "Graffiti Patrol" has been dissolved and if you see any graffiti it should be reported to the City of Calgary through the 311 operator.

On March 2020, we had a presentation from the Blockwatch Coordinator of Country Hills who offered to help us set up a Blockwatch program here in Dalhousie. The DCA put articles in the Dalhousie Digest for two successive months and posted the article on the website putting out feelers to find out if there was interest for such a program in Dalhousie. Only one person responded that they would be interested which was insufficient interest to pursue this program. It will be put on hold until there is more of a need or more interest.

The CPS recommends that one of the most effective methods to reduce crime is for residents get to know their neighbours so they can watch out for each other. Other security measures that you can practice is to lock your home, garage and vehicles, don't store tools or other valuables in your vehicle, have sufficient lighting on the exterior of your house, cut back shrubs and trees around your house and install security devices like cameras. Stay safe!

KEEP YOUR RECYCLABLES LOOSE

Put your recyclables in your blue cart loose. Make sure your recyclables are not packed too tightly or they will not fall out of the cart during pickup. The only recyclables that should be in bags are bagged plastic bags and bagged shredded paper.

Don't put recyclables in black garbage or blue recycling bags. The recycling facility isn't set up to unbag recyclables and they need to be loose to be sorted by the machines. For the safety of workers, garbage bags are marked as garbage and are not opened.

Weekly green cart pickup is returning at the end of April. Visit **calgary.ca/collection** to check your schedule and sign up for reminders, or download the Calgary Garbage Day app.

Here are some tips for using your green cart:

- All food scraps, food-soiled paper, pet waste and yard waste go in the green cart.
- Use only certified compostable bags or paper yard waste bags in your green cart no plastic bags.
- Always fill your green cart first, then fill paper yard
 waste bags. Roll tops of bags closed and set at least two
 feet to the side of your green cart.
- No plastic plant pots or bedding trays in the green cart. Rinse out and recycle in your blue cart instead.

DALHOUSIE AND NOSE HILL PARK BY ANNE BURKE



In 1993, Dalhousie was one of the 18 communities (plus a member from the Federation of Calgary Communities) on the Nose Hill Park (NHP) Communities Board. Any additional Community Association which indicated a desire to serve on the Board was welcomed. Each Association represented on the Board was responsible for the appointment of its members and alternate members All members were officially appointed because they were authorized to speak for their

organizations on routine matters and therefore represented their communities on issues regarding Nose Hill Park. As such, they were required to solicit input and direction on various Park management issues

Each member was asked to find an alternate representative through their respective community associations to attend meetings, particularly in their absence.

The Board could and did ask for input from any individual, organization, or City department considered necessary in order to arrive at an informed position on any issue. Members were informed on the issues and concerns, including the values and goals of the NHP Communities Board. To provide information, members were expected to submit articles to community newsletters, have regular communication with their Community Association Board of Directions, and maintain informal discussions with neighbors, friends, and community members. In addition, they were expected to serve on various subcommittees that were required, from time to time, in order to meet the goals and objectives of the Communities Board

WALKWAYS

Living in Dalhousie, you are no doubt aware of the network of walkways spanning our community, behind and alongside our properties, and providing residents an easy and direct means to travel throughout our community to visit friends and family, go shopping, access transit, get to school or simply take a stroll to get some exercise. Thank you to all of you who have helped to make sure these walkways and back pathways are clear of snow and ice and remain accessible through the winter! The walkways in West Dalhousie were a great idea in the 1960's and 1970's by the developer "NuWest". They were designed to increase the sense of community and interaction between neighbours. NuWest didn't put in building code restrictions that other communities put in place. Instead, they just put in "recommendations" which are not enforceable by law. As a result, most property owners in Dalhousie have opted to maximize their space and security by building built 6' high wooden fences inches from the backyard sidewalks.

HOW DOES THE CITY OF CALGARY DECIDED WHICH PATHWAYS TO CLEAR?



The following criteria is used to determine which pathways are cleared of snow:

- The number of people using the pathway in winter

The amount of risk in using and clearing the pathway; e.g. areas that are steep and/or tend to ice up
 Proximity to LRT stations, schools, business districts or recreation centers

- Connections to cycle tracks or bike lanes

Some sections of pathway, due to slope steepness or site conditions, aren't suitable for winter use due to safety concerns for users and the crews who maintain them. Citizens are discouraged from clearing pathways that are steep and unsafe for snow removal, and may become icy during melt/freeze

conditions.

Window & Balcony Safety

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often overlooked hazard in the home access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them:
- Keep drapery cords out of childrens' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard;
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing;
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

Further prevention tips

- Toddlers & preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but it may happen at any age;
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies;
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches);
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed & secure.

As April rolls around, the yellow floret of dandelions are obvious to see on lawns, sports fields and city boulevards throughout Dalhousie. Formally known as *Taraxacum Officinale*, views vary and some see them as charming, some see them as good eating, some see them as harmless, some see them as medicinal and some see them as invasive.

Well, flowers come in green and pink and red,
And they sleep all day in their little flower beds,
But the little dandelion grows wild and free,
With her uncles and cousins and the whole family tree.
Dandy, dandy, dandy, dandy, dandelion,
There's something pretty dandy about you.
Dandy, dandy, dandy, dandy, dandelion,
I wish that there were more of you!
First I make a wish, then I blow real hard,
And the little dandelions blow all over the yard.
And I wait and I hope for my wish to come true,
Guess there's only so much a dandelion can do.

One thing for sure, not everybody takes such a cheerful, hopeful view of dandelions! Those with perfectly manicured lawns frown when they see the yellow flower pop up, even if it is on their neighbours lawn or on the boulevard. There are easy ways to get rid of them and the most obvious is just use your hand or a knife or a gardening tool and pull them up before they go to seed. A second easy chemical free solution is put a tablespoon of salt on the plant. If there are a lot of dandelions to remove, the easiest solution is use a herbicide which you can buy at our local Canadian Tire.

If you are into eating them, you might be interested to know that according to Medical News Today, people eat the root, stem, leaves and flowers of the dandelion. The are used to make salads, jelly, pesto and wine. The medicinal qualities include providing antioxidants, reducing cholesterol, regulating blood sugar, reducing inflammation, lowering blood pressure, aiding weigh loss, reducing cancer risk, aiding digestion and keeping skin healthy. So whether you love them or hate them, dandelions are part of our community.

BE A PART OF THE SOLUTION: REPORTING COMMUNITY ISSUES TO THE CITY

April 2021

Have you stumbled over an uneven sidewalk, noticed a sinkhole or frost heave in the road, or came across hateful graffiti? These are only a few scenarios that can be reported to the City via their 311-application available in the iOS and Android store. The application is easily downloaded and setup. Once setup, citizens can use the application to geo-tag and flag issues for the City to follow-up on. Our City is big and our community relatively small, so bringing our items of concern to the City's mind will help in as much as "the wheel that squeaks the loudest is the one that gets the grease."

HD CARTWRIGHT SCHOOL

H.D. Cartwright School, often know in the community as simply "HD" or "HDC," has been a junior high school in the heart of Dalhousie since the 1971-72 school year. The school is named after Herbert Daniel Cartwright, a prominent educator and school administrator in Alberta, whose career spanned over four decades between 1918 and his retirement in 1959. Among his other achievements, Mr. Cartwright organized the first junior high school in Alberta (Rideau Park School) and was principal there for four years. It is coincidental that having organized that first junior high school, his namesake, H.D. Cartwright School, is one of the last remaining grade 7-9 junior high schools in the CBE. (Following the transition of most formerly junior high schools to a "middle school" format.) HDC is currently the designated public junior high school for students in Dalhousie, Ranchlands, Nolan Hill and Sherwood. It also hosts two special education programs, the Learning and Literacy program (L&L) and an ACCESS class.

In its first year of operation the school's principal, Mr. T.G. Allen, wrote of "looking forward to developing a school of which we can all be proud" and one with an "enthusiastic and cheerful atmosphere." His hopes for the school certainly materialized over the years, and HDC is known for being a friendly, caring, close-knit learning community. With an enrolment of approximately 450 students (including some currently learning online) students and staff often form close connections and relationships with one another. In fact, these positive connections are the focus of much of the work done in the school during what is referred to as "Cougar Community" time. Many past and current students can probably recite the school jingle of "HDC, we're like a family."





As might be expected, the 2020-21 school year is much different than normal, but the school continues the process of providing meaningful learning opportunities through a strong community approach. To keep students in cohort groups, students are not currently taking their ordinary options classes, but circulating through a variety of complementary courses together with their homeroom classmates. For example, Dalhousie community members may have seen students and their Environmental and Outdoor Education teacher doing some geocaching in the neighbourhood this fall. During the pandemic, regular athletics programs cannot be offered, but students are still participating in daily Physical Education classes (often outdoors). We are also keeping school spirit alive through various "House Cup" challenges between homeroom classes. These challenges have involved various socially distanced activities completed together with homeroom classmates to build school and homeroom spirit. HDC has been a part of this community for almost 50 years, and is looking forward to continuing a bright tradition of being, as the school's motto says, "A Great Place to Learn Together."
