

Dalhousie Community KindergartenActivity Ideas to Help Prepare for First Days of School

- Ask your child to help plan school snacks for the first week. You can go to the store together to shop for these items or get them to help pick out their special indoor school shoes, backpack, or water bottle.
- Visit the school playground and play a few times before the first day.
- Ask your child to help choose what they want to wear on the first few days.
- If your child has a history of separation anxiety in other settings, tell their teacher. Most teachers are experts in this area and have years of experience! At Dalhousie Community Kindergarten, our teacher, Mrs. Scherpenisse, will be visiting you and your child in your home prior to the first days of school. This will be an excellent time to talk about any concerns you may have. We want to work with you as a team.
- Most importantly, continue to praise and reward your child for brave behavior. Celebrate and praise their successes! It all helps build confidence and reassure your little ones that they are ready.

Future Layers of Dalhousie



Recently, as part the fifth and final activity of the Future Layers Project, residents of Dalhousie were invited to think about the future and amenities that they would like to see in our community. The above illustration's word cloud represents the input received. The size of the word reflects the frequency that it appeared in responses. Do any of the words in the illustration resonate with you?

The Future Layers Project involved four months of engagement with residents of our community. The objective of the project was to ask residents to contribute their thoughts, feelings, and experiences about living in Dalhousie, and was recently completed by University of Calgary Master of Planning students, Travis Dickie and Zhuxuan Ma. The community association is always looking for volunteers and there are many ways you can get involved. Memberships in our association are currently free. Join up! Get involved! We hope you will get to know our community a little better. As more of us make connections with others and participate in opportunities to provide input, our collective voices will help shape decisions that positively impact our community!

What do Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Vents Have in Common?

When you've been involved in children's programs as much as I have, you get to know which ones are excellent and which ones are okay. For my entire adult life, I've argued that the programs offered by Scouts Canada are the best available to children and youth.

How would I know? I've been a parent volunteer in several schools, a teacher's aide, a teacher, a soccer/basketball/fastball coach, Scout leader, Sunday School teacher, Children's Chess Club organizer, and many other roles working with youth. I have a Bachelor of Education - Master of Teaching degree from the University of Calgary.

Why do I hold this opinion? In addition to Scouts Canada teaching outdoor skills, they teach skills that helps children become successful later in life, more so than any other program.

Beavers, for ages 5 to 7, includes a weekly meeting and approximately once a month; a short hike or visit to a place of interest. Social skills taught include sharing.

Cubs, for ages 8 to 10, includes a weekly meeting, medium hikes and three or four overnight camping experiences per year. Individual skills taught include doing your best.

Scouts, for ages 11 to 14, includes a weekly meeting, longer hikes, camping away from vehicles and buildings three or four times per year, and a weeklong summer trip. Youth learn about being prepared, honour, loyalty, helping others, making friends, and being courteous.


Vents, for ages 14 to 17, includes a weekly meeting, challenging hikes, self sustaining, lightweight camping, and summer trips to different parts of Canada or other countries. Programs are designed around interests of the youth like first aid, or search and rescue, or culinary, or canoeing, etc.

There are badges at every level reflecting the accomplishments of the children and youth. The Chief Scout, the Queen's Venturer, and the Duke of Edinburgh awards are worthy of including on a resume for a young person.

For Scouts and Vents, there are summer "jamborees" which are gatherings of Scouts from all over Alberta or Canada or the world. It's quite incredible to see youth from all the countries of the world, representing different religions and ideologies, camping beside each other focusing on their common interests.

So, as September approaches, and you weigh your options on what program(s) to enroll your children in, consider the Scouting program. The volunteer leadership team in Dalhousie/Varsity is among the best in Calgary. The volunteer screening is the most stringent of any youth organization. 
Dalhousie Photo Submission

Dalhousie Crime is Down in May 2021

The Dalhousie community experienced 7 crimes in May 2021, in comparison to 13 crimes the previous month, and 10 crimes in May one year ago. Dalhousie experiences an average of 12.1 crimes per month. On an annual basis, Dalhousie experienced a total of 145 crimes as of May 2021, which is down 12% in comparison to 164 crimes as of May 2020. Total Dalhousie crimes is calculated as the sum of break and enters (dwelling, commercial, and other premises), theft from vehicles, theft of vehicles, assaults (nondomestic), commercial robberies, street robberies, and non-domestic 'other' violence.

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Noxious Weeds You Probably Know!

There are many noxious weeds identified in Alberta, and several common ones that you have likely seen around Dalhousie. Some may look pretty but should not be allowed to grow and spread. They have the ability to spread rapidly and cause economic and ecological hardship. Under the province's Weed Control Act, the control of noxious weeds is the responsibility of everyone, including individual homeowners.



Yellow Clematis (Clematis Tangutica)

Yellow Clematis is a perennial vine that likes to climb on fences. It has flowers that are lemon yellow, and "nodding". Seed pods are distinctive with silky-hairy clusters that eventually become "puffballs."



Creeping Bellflower (Campanula Rapunculoides)

This is a rhizomatous perennial that can grow to one metre. It has bell-shaped blue/purple flowers. They are very persistent, spreading widely by tubers and seeds.



Ox-eye Daisy (Leucanthemum Vulgare)

This is a very common perennial that spreads by root and seeds. It can grow to one metre tall. Flowers are white, daisy-like flowers with a yellow centre.



Scentless Chamomile (Tripleurospermum Indorum)

Scentless chamomile is an annual to perennial plant with fine, thread-like leaves. Plants produce numerous white, "mini daisy-like" flower heads with yellow centers.

Search online for "Alberta Noxious Weeds" to find numerous sites that include photos of these and other noxious weeds.

If you see these plants on the pathways around your house or in your yard, please dispose of them safely. Many people may not know these are noxious weeds and may admire these plants, so please be sensitive to this issue. Small quantities of noxious and invasive weeds should be bagged and disposed of directly into your black cart as garbage. They cannot be composted! These plants, and their seeds and roots, can aggressively spread during transportation and processing at the composting facility. Sending them to the landfill helps control spread and ensures the city is able to maintain high compost quality.
